- -List potential solutions to improve the implementation of advanced practice providers globally.
- -Diagnose and manage common ocular conditions encountered in primary care.
- -Identify, provide appropriate initial management, and appropriately arrange for definitive care for ocular emergencies.

- -Discuss how these grants are funded.
- -Describe Income Based Repayment Plan.
- -Summarize the Public Service Loan Forgiveness Act.
- -Identify other ways to speed up educational loan repayment.
- -Assess the ethical basis for patient spiritual care.
- -Discuss the use of taking a spiritual history during patient visits.
- -Illustrate how to provide basic spiritual care to patients in an ethical, professional, and non-coercive manner.
- -Describe the many roles and opportunities of a nurse on the mission field to provide comfort, hope, honor, and dignity for the suffering.
- -List ways to build cross-cultural relationships
- -Compare the different strategies related to health promotion and disease prevention, including community development.
- -Identify the ways cultural values, beliefs, and traditions influence healthcare practices and why they are important to consider before going to the field.
- -Cite cultural influences in how health and healthcare is defined, sought and delivered.
- -Examine our own cultural biases.
- -Describe a framework that can develop cultural competency.
- -Determine how global principles in missional medicine can be applied in domestic settings
- Relate experiences in training and practice in the US with potential international work.
- -Identify models and strategies that connect overseas work with domestic work, and vise versa.
- -Study principles and attributes of practice and policy that define the concept of missional medicine and healthcare delivery to underserved populations.
- -List global leading causes of death in children under 5 years of age.
- -Identify common pediatric illnesses and emergencies in children under 5 years of age in resource-poor settings.
- -Describe steps to creating simple, evidence-based treatment protocols.
- -Discuss the role of maternal education in improved outcomes for children under 5 years of age.
- -Cite the background of Mbingo Baptist Hospital.
- -Describe the difficulties encountered in beginning and running the Internal Medicine residency program.
- -Describe the benefits for patient care and the development of the hospital from the residency program.
- -Discuss the prospects of developing Internal Medicine residencies in other mission hospitals in Africa.
- -Identify the clinical presentation of fever in a returned traveler and appropriate diagnostic testing.

- -Diagnose visually several common skin lesions in travelers.
- -Compare various tropical disease, causes of diarrhea, and abdominal complaints.
- -Describe the human microbiome and some of its impact on health and immunity.
- -Identify the different ethical systems encountered on the mission field
- -State the practical problems that result in trying to run a hospital, developed through 2000 years of Christian history, in an animistic ethical system.
- -Identify epidemiological evidence for post-crisis population vulnerability.
- -Discuss implications of epidemiological evidence and clinical evidence for mental health care in the early and late post crisis time frame.
- -Identify models to integrate general health principles with faith-based mental health principles in the care of specific post crisis populations.
- -Outline specific models for global health care workers and for clinical populations.
- -List the medical limitations one often finds in the developing world.
- -List the assets presented in the developing world.
- -Identify the approaches one might use to develop the assets into a working model for the developing world.
- -Summarize why home-based care can reduce costs.
- -List steps in developing human resource for home-based care.
- -Cite many opportunities in integrating technology with home care.
- -Outline how and why home-based care can be financially sustainable.
- -Discuss the need for all disciplines caring for patient's health and spiritual needs to have a cooperative and supportive approach.
- -Describe how this inter-disciplinary approach can be used and modeled in a mission hospital or healthcare educational setting.
- -List steps to take which would minimize problems and might interfere with instituting an inter-disciplinary approach in a mission setting.
- -Identify the complex reasons women stay in abusive relationships and dispel common myths.
- -Evaluate how a healthcare worker's response can create fear, shame, or resistance, or become a source of hope.
- -Examine the importance of listening to her story, believing her, and assuring her she has value.
- -Describe the damaging psychological impact of repeated traumatic episodes experienced by abused women.
- -Describe what it means to be ""American"" culturally
- -Identify how "who we are culturally"" will likely conflict with ""who they are culturally""
- -List the first steps of a strategy for avoiding and/or overcoming cultural conflicts.
- -Identify three ways dental and spiritual care are making an impact on patients' lives.
